
Book Update

Masonville Mills

This rare photo shows the 1827 and 1831 Masonville Mills, on the land across from Johnny's Package Store Grosvenordale. in The entire village was then known as Masonville because of these 2 mills. Only a small section of one mill remains today. The bell tower shown on the left stood in front of the mill that ran towards the river. This is one of the photos in our upcoming book.

Thanks to Charlie Trudeau, Paul Duquette and the Tanson Family, water service has been restored at the Old Town Hall.


Allen & Barbara Bennett wrote to tell us that Hallie Bennett from Quaddic Road, Thompson Hill has turned 106 years old!!


Previous Mystery Photo: No one identified the mill location or name but one person thought it was a picker stick factory.





A section of the 1855 Woodford Windham County Map The Museum Shop will be selling a reproduction of this map this Fall.

Notice the commercial nature of Thompson Hill at that time.



View of mill pond off Rt. 12 in Grosvenordale— The 1862/63 mill now being demolished was served by this mill pond. This view is looking towards North Grosvenordale with Rt. 12 running north towards the Masonville Mill section of town, visible at the top of the photo. A photo of the Masonville Mills in the early days is on page 3 of this newsletter. Three interesting buildings can be seen in the photo above. The left arrow points to the old Grosvenordale General Store (Dery's, Kristek's, Hutchinson's). The store burned about 1950. The middle arrow shows the old church (with bell tower intact), now a home. It was a Girl's Club for years. The right arrow shows the Fire House, now the Grosvenordale Post Office.



Valley Springs Sportsman's Club—For half a century, the club has been a part of Thompson life. On the left, Tootsie Duquette keeps an eye on the camera and misses the 'catch'. BBQs, skeet shooting, "The Great Fishing Derby", baseball, ice skating parties and more have kept the club alive. These grainy shots are some of the earliest of Valley Springs in the THS collection.



This is an greatly enlarged section of a 1940 photo at the Marot School. The school had a tradition of selecting a May Day Queen who presided at the annual May Day Ball. Though blurry, the 'Queen' can be seen here flanked by her two 'maids'. Please participate in our May-Day program. We want your memories!!!!

Ask The Society

- Q. What was the Andem baseball team named after? (see attached photo)
- A. The Andem team was one of the baseball teams sponsored by the Grosvenordale Company. This photo, taken about 1910, shows the team, named after the Grosvenordale Company Mill Agent C. S. Andem. Bottom row: Mederic Seney, 2nd - batboy?, Armand Blanchette; Middle row: man in center with bow tie C.S. Andem (or it could be manager?), 4th from left Arsene Frappier; Top row: 4th from left Neri Coderre, 5th George Carlson, 6th Joe Marcustry
- Q. How did County Home Road get its name?
- A. County Home Road, also known as Route 21, used to have the Windham County Children's Home located near the Rt.44 intersection. This area was once Thompson.
- Q. Where was the Mechanics Inn?
- A. This was another name for the French River Inn on Rt. 12 in Mechanicsville. See photo at left.
