DESCRIPTION (Continued)	17 OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING OR SITE (interior and/or exterior)	
	<p>Five-bay facade, central entry. Four two story paneled pilasters with entasis divide facade into three parts. Sash generally 6-over-6, some old. Entry has old paneled door, sidelights flanked by paneled pilasters. Sidelights and semi-elliptical fanlight have elaborate leaded glazing, including circular panes edged in cast lead floral decorations, bulls-eye panes. Fanlight has wood-muntin radial glazed fan behind it.</p> <p>Wide transom with small paneled pilasters with carved sunburst medallions on capitals. Frieze with carved stars in bas-relief, scallops under flat molded cap. Palladian window above entry: central 6-over-6 window with three pane flanking windows, radial glazed semi-circular light above with molded round arched surround.</p> <p>Above flanking windows, frieze with swags, flat molded caps. Main cornice: frieze with swags, scallops under molded cornice; cornice shows partial return. Large twin brick chimneys. Endwalls are brick and splayed brick window lintels. Plain cross-gabled rear wing with 2-over-2 sash.</p>

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SIGNIFICANCE	19 HISTORICAL OR ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE	
	<p>This house was built about 1815 by William G. Larned, a gentleman farmer and member of a prominent local family. Larned, born in Thompson in 1784, died in 1871.</p> <p>Historically, the house is significant for its connection to the Larned family, and as part of a large and well preserved assemblage of older houses in the village of Thompson Hill. When this house was built in 1815, Thompson Hill was a prosperous trading center at the intersection of the Boston-Hartford and Providence-Springfield turnpikes.</p> <p>Architecturally, the William G. Larned house is significant as an example of the Federal or Adam style. The extravagant decoration of the facade owes some of its splendor to later remodelling, but a good deal of the classically inspired trim is probably original. The brick endwalls are a locally popular feature.</p>
