17 OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING OR SITE (interior and/or exterior)

Four-bay facade, central entry in second bay. Modern wood door, rectangular glazed transom. Sash generally 1-over-1 and old 6-over-6. Later exterior brick chimney on right. Left plain.

19 HISTORICAL OR ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE

This house, built sometime in the 19th century, became attached at some point to the Fabyan woolen mills, first established by Englishman Edward Howard in 1829 ( a small c. 1940 woolen mill still operates in Fabyan today).

Historically, this house is significant for its connection to the mills, and as part of a small assemblage of older buildings preserved in this 19th century mill village.

Architecturally, it is considerably altered, but preserves its general massing and a good deal of older fabric (including the old 6-over-6 sash).
