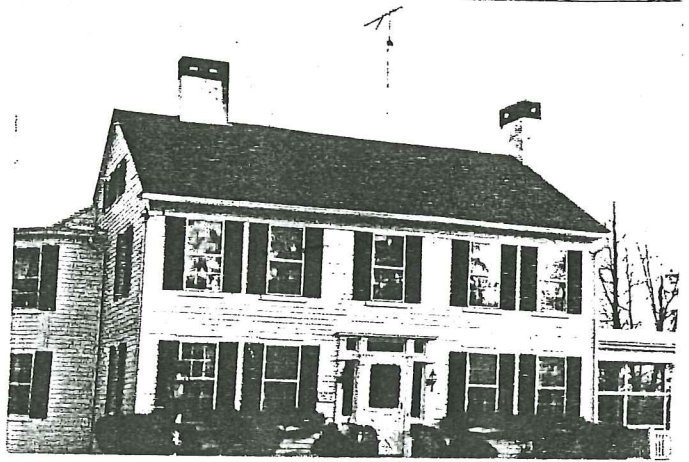

17 OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING OR SITE (interior and/or exterior)

Five-bay facade, central entry. Window bays paired and offset towards corners of house. Entry has rectangular side and transom lights with leaded star-and-oval glazing, cast-lead arrows and floral decorations. Sidelights are flanked by narrow fluted pilasters with panelled capitals. Heavy wooden door with cruciform panels. Slender plain corner pilasters, molded architrave, plain frieze, molded cornice shows partial return.

Right elevation has exterior brick chimney flanked by quarter-circle windows. Tuscan-columned Colonial Revival porch. Left elevation has plain two-story bay window.

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19 HISTORICAL OR ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE

The earliest known occupant of this house was Walter Bates, a carpenter, cabinetmaker, and builder, who sold the dwelling in 1841 to Squire Barston Hascall.

Several architectural influences can be detected in the building. The five-bay form, paired offset windows, and ridge-parallel-to-street orientation are all typical of early 19th-century vernacular dwellings. The entry, corner, pilasters, and frieze are typical of the transition between the Federal and Greek Revival styles. The right porch, quarter-circular attic windows, and Tuscan-columned right porch are 20th century Colonial Revival features.

Historically, it is significant for its association with Bates, a prominent businessman in 19th-century Thompson Hill, and as part of a large and well-preserved assemblage of 19th-century buildings in this hilltop village.
