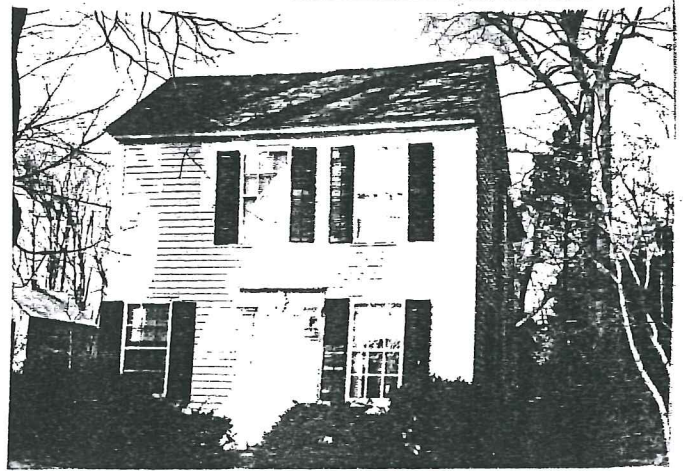

17 OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING OR SITE (interior and/or exterior)

Two-bays over three, central entry. Narrow facade. Old batten door flanked by chamfered pilasters with denticular capitals. Flat molded denticular cap above plain frieze. Applied heraldic shield on frieze. Sash 6-over-6 (later).

Large central chimney behind ridge. Molded cornice shows partial return. Cross-gabled rear wing.

19 HISTORICAL OR ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE

Little could be discovered about the early history of this building. In 1866, it was sold by the locally prominent Larned family; the complexity of their extensive land holdings makes its earlier ownership impossible to trace.

The building is historically and architecturally significant as part of a large assemblage of older houses in Thompson Hill, originally a cross roads trading center at the intersection of the Boston-Hartford and Providence-Springfield turnpikes (opened in 1797 and 1803, respectively). The building's asymmetrical, narrow facade and large central brick chimney are consistent with a building date in the 18th or early 19th century.
