A working replica of a siege engine based on a historical design from the 1200s is located today at Fort Hill Farm, once the site of a Native American

hill top fort. The siege engine was used to send rocks over castle walls mainly in Europe and further east but eventually fell out of use followdevelopment of gunpowder. ing

Demonstrations were held at Fort Hill to show visitors the throwing engine's operation. Pumpkins were used in place of stones and the throwing distances ranged from 100 to 300 feet. Funds raised will benefit the Congregational Church restoration project.

Congregational Church Bells are Ringing Again!



In November, the State Historic Preservation Office awarded a \$20,000 matching grant to the Thompson Congregational Church for the purposes of selecting an architect to draw up the plans for the church's restoration. Bruce Hall, Moderator, told SHPO that "the state's unwavering support for the restoration of this building has given us the confidence that this restoration can be managed for the benefit of the congregation and all of Thompson."

The Thompson Congregational Church partnered with the Thompson Historical Society to attempt to get the chimes ringing once again after an almost four-

year absence. Paul Provost, a board member of the Thompson Historical Society and a retired power engineer from the computing industry, successfully restored the chimes and bells at the Congregational Church. He said that having an

opportunity to climb up into the bell tower, which is above the clock section, was a once in a lifetime experience and the view was awesome. He also shared this photo of the bell. A longtime resident of Thompson said 'hearing I really missed hearing them.'

East Thompson Train Wreck Site & Model




(Model of the East Thompson Wreck Site being built by Stan Swanson to be located at the Ramsdell Room at TMHS. Work continues on the project.)

The National Park Service, Thompson Trails, the Thompson Historical Society and the Last Green Valley collaborated on a wonderful program on November 10, 2020 on a proposed Airline Trail park on the site of East Thompson Train Station and the Great 1891 Four Engine Wreck site.

The plan is to create enhancements to the existing popular hiking site, perhaps one of the most visited outdoor sites in the Northeast Corner of CT. The public presentation of 11/10/20 was to explain the new park plan and to solicit ideas from interested parties.

A Letter from a THS Member

October 13, 2020

Dear Members,

I just received the recent newsletter and enjoy reading the history of my home town. It brings back many memories.

I was especially happy to see the work being done to refurbish the William H. Mason House. I knew it as the place where Lloyd and Mrs. Seaver lived. It was in very good condition then—I know, because at age 14, I became her house cleaner, working Tuesday and Thursday afternoons after school and Saturday mornings. I was paid \$.50 an hour. She was a stickler and everything had to be done just so. As a Christmas gift she gave me a gift box of thread from Belding Hemingway, where Lloyd was a VP I believe. I still have that box of thread. I was sure upset when we rode by and saw it falling to pieces. Lloyd's mother and father lived in the small house in the back.

I also was the babysitter for many of the Thompson Hill families, as was my sister. The Ryscavages always asked me to stay with Jerry and Paul. Paul was not in school and my mother took care of him— early day care. I was so pleased to see them at the TMHS reunion.

Thank you for your work and time on the Thompson Historical Society.
